**SYNOPSIS:** Angela, a warm, witty Denver-based lawyer and single mom, never expected a random conversation about "the one that got away" to send her down a rabbit hole of digital sleuthing, emotional nostalgia, and unexpected holiday magic. But when her friend helps her track down Alex—her charming British ex from college, now a widower living in France—an email reconnects them just before Christmas.

What begins as cautious curiosity soon blossoms into heartfelt FaceTime calls, laughter-filled confessions, and the stirring of old flames. As each navigates the chaotic joys and complications of single parenthood, family obligations, and personal loss, the spark that once united them is reignited. They rediscover the electric chemistry they once shared. The "what ifs" of their past become the "maybe we coulds" of their future.

But love in the digital age is complicated. Between time zones, meddling friends, two clever ten-year-olds, and the ghosts of past

relationships, the logistical and emotional hurdles are immense.
